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CE Event (4 CEs total)

Part I: Applied Learning Experience

This CE course will review basic concepts of intersectionality and highlight the heterogeneity among underserved cultural communities (UCCs) and describe their application to different aspects of the neuropsychological assessments. While the emphasis will be on the Hispanic population, the concepts discussed will have relevance when conducting assessments with other UCCs. In the workshop-style portion of this event, attendees will have the opportunity to work through clinical cases, integrating constructs of intersectionality. Participants will receive neuropsychological cases and navigate through several stations where issues pertinent to intersectionality for the given case will be highlighted. In the end, participants will accumulate resources, materials, and knowledge that could be applied in their daily practice.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Participants will be able to assess some of the complexities and nuances of conducting a neuropsychological assessment with UCCs and expand beyond categorizing patients into discrete demographic groups like race and/or ethnicity.**
- 2. Participants will be better equipped to conduct a clinical interview from a culturally informed perspective.**
- 3. Participants will be able to design a more tailored and culturally appropriate assessment including norm and language selection, and be more prepared to interpret results when patients are not well represented in normative samples (e.g. extreme ends of education levels, bilingual patients, etc.)**
- 4. Participants will be better prepared to provide feedback to patients from UCCs.**

Part II: Panel Discussion

This CE course will leverage the resources and procedures practiced during Part A of this event to illustrate ways to integrate intersectionality constructs into neuropsychological practice across different settings. Building on their own experience as seasoned scientist-practitioners, the panelists will: 1. Describe how intersectionality theory influences their approach to clinical care with culturally and linguistically diverse patients; 2. Provide examples of how intersectionality theory influences their approach to mentorship and training; 3. Discuss special considerations related to the work with a pediatric population that is uniquely suited for applying intersectionality tenets. In the end, panelists will discuss ways to integrate intersectionality to optimize service delivery within healthcare and academic medical settings.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Participants will be able to identify ways to incorporate intersectionality into all aspects of the neuropsychological evaluation.**
- 2. Participants will be able to list examples of how intersectionality may influence their approach to supervision and mentoring.**
- 3. Participants will be able to describe specific scenarios when intersectionality tenets may help to optimize interactions with families in the context of pediatric evaluations.**
- 4. Participants will be able to list tangible examples wherein intersectionality can be applied to optimize service delivery for diverse communities in healthcare and academic medical settings.**
